Three juries decide fate of defendants charged with felony property crimes

The DA's Property Team tried three property crime cases the week of February 7, 2011, in Mecklenburg County Superior Court. The trials were held in courtroom 5150.

Shea Roseboro, 21, was tried for 1) possession of stolen vehicle 2) larceny of motor vehicle 3) driving while license revoked. The jury returned a verdict of *not guilty* of possession of stolen vehicle, *not guilty* of larceny of motor vehicle and *guilty* of driving with a revoked license. Roseboro was sentenced to 45 days active by The Honorable Andrew R. Hassell, Superior Court Judge.

Arlan Hall, 19, was tried for felony larceny. The jury returned a verdict of not guilty.

Joshua Ricks, 21, was tried for 1) felony residential breaking and entering 2) felony larceny after breaking and entering and 3) felony possession of stolen goods. The jury returned a verdict of *guilty* felony possession of stolen goods and *not guilty* felony breaking and entering and *not guilty* of felony larceny after breaking and entering. Ricks was sentenced to 5-6 months suspended, 24 months supervised probation by Judge Hassell.

Three defendants resolved their cases by guilty plea during the trial week:

Antonio White, 23, pled guilty to 2 counts of felony possession of stolen goods. White was sentenced to 5-6 months suspended, 36 months supervised probation, restitution and no contact with the victim by Judge Hassell.

Jonathan Welch, 23, pled guilty to misdemeanor breaking and entering and misdemeanor larceny. Welch was sentenced to 45 days active, suspended, 24 months supervised probation, 50 hours community service and restitution by Judge Hassell.

Anton Brown, 22, pled guilty to six counts of felony breaking and entering a motor vehicle. Brown was sentenced to 6-8 months suspended, 36 month supervised probation, \$2,000 restitution, 100 hours community service and was ordered to continue with his education by Judge Hassell.
