## Habitual breaking or entering offender among 28 convicted of property crimes

CHARLOTTE, N.C. – A habitual breaking or entering offender who broke into two Charlotte homes was among the 28 defendants recently convicted by the Mecklenburg County District Attorney's Crimes Against Property Team. The defendants entered their guilty pleas February 27-March 3, 2017, before The Honorable Robert T. Sumner, Superior Court Judge. The convictions were for crimes that included breaking or entering, possession of a stolen motor vehicle, obtaining property by false pretense and insurance fraud.

Among those convicted were:

Terrayl Glisson, 30, pled guilty to 1) two counts of felony breaking or entering and 2) being a habitual breaking or entering status offender. He was sentenced to 26-44 months in prison. In May 2016, police received reports of two residential break-ins in Charlotte's Starmount neighborhood. The first victim was home with her young child when she heard her doorbell ring several times. She did not open the door, and moments later, she heard a loud bang coming from downstairs. When she went to see what was going on, she saw Glisson kicking in a rear door. An hour later, another victim in the same neighborhood received a call from a neighbor who told him that his back door was open. The neighbor informed him that she had heard loud banging coming from the victim's townhome. The victim returned home and found that his house had been ransacked and that he was missing a firearm, two backpacks, tools and two pairs of sunglasses. Charlotte-Mecklenburg police crime scene officers located a palm print from the exterior side of a rear door, which had been kicked in. Soon, a lab analyst confirmed that the palm print left at the scene matched that of Glisson.

Damonte Hatcher, 18, pled guilty to 1) felony breaking or entering and 2) larceny after breaking or entering. He was sentenced to 8-19 months in prison.

Dayveon Clark, 19, pled guilty to 1) felony breaking or entering and 2) larceny after breaking or entering. He was sentenced to 8-19 months in prison.

Tamario King, 31, pled guilty to felony larceny. He was sentenced to 6-17 months in prison.

Brandon Martin, 19, pled guilty to two counts of felony breaking or entering. He was sentenced to 8-19 months in prison.

Keon Hunter, 19, pled guilty to two counts of felony breaking or entering. He was sentenced to 8-19 months in prison.

*Note: Almost all guilty pleas entered in criminal administrative court are the result of an agreed upon plea arrangement between the State and the defendant, which is then approved by the sentencing judge.
